Architect and associate professor Tim de Noble has been appointed department head of the University of Arkansas Department of Architecture, which will celebrate its 60th birthday next year. His leadership will be grounded in a hands-on familiarity with every aspect of the architecture program.

"Tim de Noble has taught virtually all of the studios and technology courses in the department since coming on board in 1997. He has also led students on trips to Nova

Scotia and Peru and has taught in the School of Architecture's international study programs in Rome and Mexico City," said Jeff Shannon, dean of the School of Architecture. "I know that Tim will be outstanding in this new role. Fortunately for our students, Tim will continue to have a teaching presence in the department, especially in design studios."

Architecture Firm Supports UA Student Travel

Affording the required semester of study abroad will get a little bit easier for University of Arkansas School of Architecture students thanks to a \$50,000 gift from PB2 Architecture and Engineering.

The Rogers firm, formerly Perry L. Butcher & Associates, recently made a gift to create the PB2 Architecture Honors College International Experience Endowment, which will support international travel for honors architecture students. The gift will be matched by \$50,000 from the Matching Gift Program to create a \$100,000 endowment

“Foreign travel is critical to expanding our students’ frame of reference as designers, and we are grateful to PB2 for making this part of the students’ educational experience more affordable,” said School of Architecture Dean Jeff Shannon.


“We feel that the architectural history and urban experience that students encounter abroad is vital to the success of the School of Architecture’s program, which we’re pleased to support,” said John Mack, AIA. “From a professional standpoint, we look at a strong school of architecture as being vital to architecture in the state.”

With the cost of the semester abroad coming on top of ongoing expenses for materials and field trips to project sites, the professional degrees offered by the School of Architecture are costly to pursue.

“Fortunately, we have received generous support for our school’s programs from design professionals across the country and especially in the region. This is our largest gift ever from an architectural firm, and we appreciate PB2’s leadership and vision,” said Charlotte Taylor, director of development for the UA School of Architecture.

Architecture firms that have created endowments to support the School of Architecture during the UA Campaign for the Twenty-First Century include Brackett-Krennerich & Associates, PA of Jonesboro and Fayetteville; Miller Boskus Lack Architects, PA of Springdale; and Howell & Vancuren and the McIntosh Group, both of Tulsa, Okla. Other firms who have supported the school’s campaign include Polk Stanley Rowland Curzon Porter Architects Ltd. and Wittenberg, Delony & Davidson Inc, both with offices in Little Rock and Fayetteville. Little Rock firms Roark Perkins Perry and Yelvington; Steelman Connell Moseley Architects, PA; the Wilcox Group; and Witsell Evans & Rasco also have created endowments for the School of Architecture.

“These funds are used to support faculty research, student scholarships and awards, our lecture series, and other events and programs that enrich the students’ experience,” Taylor said.

can play anywhere in the field.

De Noble looks forward to developing unique aspects of the architecture program, which fostered talents such as the late Fay Jones.

“The department of architecture has strengths rooted in a long-held appreciation of architectural production and craft. I’d like to build on those strengths and follow an agenda that is distinct from most schools of architecture,” de Noble said. The tangible aspects of architecture such as materials and detailing are overlooked in many programs, he noted.

“Architectural space is paramount at any scale, yet some schools never get past merely delimiting it. We want to continue to investigate all of the qualities that create place, including materiality, detailing, light, and of course use, its social construct,” he added.

“Tim is an outstanding teacher and designer and, moreover, is familiar with all aspects of our program,” said Marlon Blackwell, an associate professor of architecture who has taught multiple design studios with de Noble.


Laura Terry, an associate professor of architecture, added: “Tim recognizes the diversity of the faculty and as department head, he will celebrate the unique qualities we all bring to the school.”

Born and raised in Little Rock, de Noble earned a Bachelor of Science in architecture from the University of Texas at Arlington in 1986 and a Master of Architecture from Syracuse University in 1992. He subsequently taught at Syracuse University and designed projects in Ecuador, upstate New York and Arkansas. He taught for two years in Florence before returning to his native Arkansas to join the faculty at the University of Arkansas and open his firm, denoblearchitecture, P.A.

De Noble’s design practice largely centers on residential projects that fuse modernist space with vernacular building precedents. A current project, the Bakhita Ridge House in Washington County,

exemplifies his approach. The 2000-square-foot home has a simple shed form and rustic materials – Galvalume and cast concrete walls and steel sunscreens with cypress planking – that complement the vintage cedar barn on site. De Noble is also known for sensitive renovations of historic homes such as Chris and Lynn Parker’s residence, which was published in *At Home* in Arkansas. De Noble spent his childhood in the Parker’s home, located in the Pulaski Heights neighborhood in Little Rock.

“I grew up in that home. It’s a beautiful, Craftsman-style residence that very much awakened my interest in architecture,” de Noble said. De Noble received a Citation Design Award from the American Institute of Architects for his design of the Garner/Herring House in 2002, and a number of his renovation projects have been published in regional magazines.

In addition to teaching design studios and technology courses, and participating in international study programs, de Noble has led seminars on small town morphology, using Arkansas towns such as Decatur, Sulphur Springs and Monte Ne as examples of how towns change over time. He has delivered papers on diverse topics at international, national and regional conferences and in 2001 organized an exhibition of models completed by UA architecture students at the national headquarters of the American Institute of Architects in Washington, D.C.

De Noble is active in the profession and in the community. He served as chair of the northwest Arkansas section of the AIA in 2004 and last spring helped coordinate the “Birds in Paradise” birdhouse design competition and auction in support of the Elizabeth Richardson Center in Springdale. He is a past board member of Habitat for Humanity and has been a member of the Fayetteville Rotary Club since 1999. He and his wife Anne de Noble have three sons.

AIA State Convention Golf Outing

A new twist on the AIA State Convention Golf Tournament is being planned this year. Instead of a golf tournament the emphasis is being placed on this being a golf outing instead. The format for the outing will be a stroke play outing with each person playing his/her ball from tee to green. Think of it, you don't have to find three friends and talking them into driving to Hot Springs to play another scramble and you don't have to worry about Thad Kelly hiring his local Club Pro and his former high school golf coach and some mystery player with a tour card showing up and posting a 51 and making the rest of us look like we have never played. Instead join us at Hot Springs Country Club for a fun relaxing round of golf with our participating allied members. Now for you serious golfers we will determine some flights so we can crown some winners.

Flights will be determined based on the AIA Modified Stableford Format. Before the round I will have the Country Club Pro select 2 holes on the front and 2 on the back. He will not divulge this information until after the round is complete. A value will be given to a birdie, par, bogey and double bogey for each of the 4 selected holes. Camp Aldersgate Dining Hall Receives State's First LEED "Gold" Certification

The USGBC LEED "Gold" plaque at the front of the Camp Aldersgate Commons building is just one of the many sustainable aspects of a place rooted in rich history and leadership. Founded by the United Methodist Women in the 1940s, it was a 120-acre turkey farm outside of Little Rock that became one of the first racially integrated meeting places in the United States. Camp Aldersgate has been quietly and earnestly sustaining this community and state for sixty years since its inception. It was a beacon of leadership in the 60s, initiating programs for senior citizens and



in the 70s it was the first camp in the state to begin providing outdoor programming for children with special needs programs that continued to grow. In August 2001 the camp once again proved its leadership and vision by committing to retain its coveted west Little Rock location as open green space and further, to rebuild all camp structures to exceed accessibility standards for its campers with structures that would be rooted in sustainable, environmentally sound strategies.

A new camp "Commons" dining and activity center, designed by Wilcox

Group Architects in association with RPPY Architects, was envisioned to serve as the main communal facility for the campers as well as establishing a new camp aesthetic. The 12,000 GSF building includes a new main dining hall seating 250; a small dining/meeting room for 20; a commercial kitchen; a large, sub-dividable classroom/arts space, which can expand out and into a large covered porch; oversized, accessible restrooms designed for children with special needs; and a large, public entry hall.

The building, crafted on both the exterior and interior of stone, glass and wood is enwrapped by a large elevated porch and is bisected by the building's central public concourse. This "hall of trees" serves both as the main circulation and informal gathering between the dining hall and the classroom(s), and as the visual and physical focal point for campers. The dining hall, anchored on the west by a large indoor/outdoor stone fireplace, opens its glu-laminated structure to gather light from the south. In contrast, the classroom's roof form is inverted – opening north to collect soft, indirect light most suited to the activity within.

Philosophically, the commitment to exceed the building's extensive accessible design guidelines was mirrored in the environmental stewardship of the building's construction and operation. The design team chose to utilize the LEEDTM-NC green building rating system, as a sustainable framework to guide them through design strategies



that would result in a facility that included an inspirational response to its environment, was responsible in its use of resources and a healthy place to occupy for its users. Extensive, integrated work sessions with all stakeholders resulted in sustainable features such as 89% natural day lighting, low or non-toxic emitting materials, 75% construction waste diversion, a high efficiency, lake-coupled geothermal mechanical system (resulting in a 46% reduction in energy cost), extensive use of recycled content (such as cotton insulation), low-flow plumbing fixtures, and a 700 gallon storm water collection tank for use in outdoor



landscaping irrigation. The tireless effort and collaboration of the integrated design team was realized when the project was awarded the state's first LEED "Gold" Certification.

Winrock Earns Gold for New Green Building

A First for Nabholz Construction and Arkansas

Winrock International recently received a gold level certification from the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Green Building rating system. It is the first office building in Arkansas ever to receive this honor and the first gold-certified project completed by Nabholz Construction.

The building construction also yielded another first for Nabholz, as the company undertook its first large-scale construction waste recycling effort diverting 78.8 percent of construction wastes from the landfill, some 49.5 tons.

The building is Winrock's new headquarters in Little Rock and is one of only 70 facilities in the United States to earn the gold rating. In a press release issued by Winrock, Frank Tugwell, Winrock International's president and chief executive officer stated, "The Gold rating is something we've worked diligently to achieve, not just Winrock but the individuals and firms who have been a part of raising this building."
